RABBI'S MONTHLY MESSAGE

Some time ago, an article appeared in the newspaper about a sinking pleasure boat near Chesapeake Bay.

The skipper of the boat desperately radioed the Coast Guard for help. The Coast Guard answered: "We're on our way! What's your position?" The yachtsman answered, "I am the executive vice-president of the First National Bank, now please hurry!"

Perhaps, more often than not, people around us judge us by these roles we play; but on a deeper spiritual and psychological level—so do we. Psychologists tell us that men are more prone to identify more with their work than women do. There is a real psychological danger if we over-identify with our professional persona, for who would we be outside of our careers and status?

In the days of Late Antiquity, Greek and Roman actors used to wear a special a theatrical mask that hid the actor's face and revealed the part he would play known as the *persona*, the root word from which "person" comes from.

To the Swiss psychiatrist Carl Jung, the persona represents the social face we as individuals wear when we present ourselves to the world—"a kind of mask, designed on the one hand to make a definite impression upon others, and on the other to conceal the true nature of the individual."

However, the various masks and personas we wear or manifest do not fool God. Rabbi Zusha of Anapol once summed it up in the immortal words: In the afterlife, God isn't going to ask me: "Why weren't you like Samuel or Joshua?" The Almighty is going to ask me: "Why weren't you like Zusha?"

Zusha's question is at the heart of the High Holiday season. **Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur beckons us to be real— first with ourselves, our relationships, and with God.**

Such truthfulness may be difficult to bear, but we must be truthful firstly with ourselves. Rosh Hashanah celebrates the birthday of Adam, and if we look into Adam's encounter with God, we might learn something valuable about our spiritual relationship with the Divine.

You may recall that when Adam and Eve disobeyed God by eating the forbidden fruit, God asked him, "Where are you?" (Gen 3:9). One might wonder: Did God not already know where Adam was? But the question God posed is existential; Adam means "human being," and in a certain sense, God asks each of us on Rosh Hashanah the same question He asked Adam on the day of his creation: "Where are you?"

Our time in this world is limited. Grappling with human mortality can be intimidating--especially when faced with a dangerous illness. Yet, our temporal limitations ought to create within us a yearning to realize our life potential. Rosh Hashanah is a time of awakening; it is also an invitation to look inward at where we have gone with our lives thus, far. It also presents us with a divine imperative to "boldly go where no person has gone before."

Rosh Hashanah teaches us the need to count time and make it important. It is not the horizontal length of our lives that matters; it is the vertical depth we can infuse each year, each day, and each moment with a quality of sublimity and holiness.

Rosh Hashanah symbolism reminds us of the need to embrace sweetness with our mental clarity in making this world a better place for all.

Judaism also teaches us that bringing sanctity and sweetness in our interpersonal relations. This is a great challenge each of us can achieve—but only if we keep our eye on the ball.

Think of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur as God's gift for us to realign our souls and live with greater enthusiasm and spiritual purpose. It is a time for us to pay attention to the blessings that suffuse our daily lives and develop an attitude of gratitude for life's many gifts.

And may we all be blessed with sweet New Year!
